Dear Members and Friends of First Presbyterian Church Chatham (FPC),

The story of how the followers of Jesus responded in the days following his crucifixion is fascinating. The whole Jesus-movement could have collapsed at that critical moment. *But it didn't!* The book of Acts is Luke's account of the life of the early church, beginning with the disciples' confusion over what was to happen next (Acts 1:6) and ending with the gospel message reaching Rome – the political center of their world (Acts 28:30-31). How did that transformation happen? Three things come to my mind: (a) They were convinced of Jesus' bodily resurrection – that Jesus was truly alive again (Acts 1:3); (b) they were empowered by the Holy Spirit – the same divine spirit that empowered Jesus (Acts 2; Luke 3:21-22); (c) the early church devoted themselves to *four* very important things: the apostles' teaching, building community, sharing hospitality (including Holy Communion), and prayer (Acts 2:42). That devotion resulted in unity, and the works of God became evident among them (Acts 4:32-33).

During this vacancy I encourage you to reflect again on those foundations and priorities of the early church. At the moment things may seem confusing, but as in the early church, things will gradually take shape. One that note: Session has formally asked the Presbytery (at its Sept 24th meeting) for permission to start the search process for a new minister. Once approved, Session will be creating a Search Team (led by me), which will then start the process of writing a "profile" of FPC – a complete description of the church, its mission and vision. While the Search Team's work is confidential, you will be regularly updated on its progress. *Pray for FPC, its Session and Search Team*.

I have been most heartened this summer with your ongoing activities, including the Backyard Mission and the Saturday Breakfast programs, and that church attendance (and giving) continues to be good following Rev. Mike Maroney's retirement. We are blessed to have Rev. Paul's ministry and the tireless work of *many* volunteers. Thank you for your service and commitment, something we acknowledge on Anniversary Sunday, October 20th. I am excited by the prospects ahead and to be sharing this journey with you. May God's grace be powerfully at work among us.

DEVOTIONAL

Many of you know that I did my graduate theological work in the beautiful State of Oregon. And while I was there, I met many of the most wonderful people I have ever known – almost as wonderful as *here*! And, of course, I ended up marrying one of them.

But, one year, as I was preparing to come back to Ontario for the summer to make a little money on the farm, I was called by the minister of a church in the city. They had learned that I was heading east, and that I didn't have a car at that point, and asked if I would consider driving an older lady across the country, as she was moving back to her hometown in New York state. I ended up driving her car, and pulling a trailer, loaded with her furniture, from Portland, Oregon to some small town not far outside Buffalo. The lady was, I suppose, about the same age I am now, and I was about 24 at the time, so she seemed ancient to me. She was a pleasant Christian lady named Sophia, an Italian American, and she chatted merrily to me all the way across the United States.

When we arrived in the town – and the name of it escapes me – I was not prepared for the reception. It was like something out of that movie, *My Big Fat Greek Wedding*. Only, these were Italians. People filled the front yard and part of the street. I was a hero. I had brought their precious Sophia home. I was hugged to death, especially by the elderly matriarch of the family, Sophia's mother. Then, everyone was ushered into the house, where there was a celebratory feast. I never saw so much food in my life! That evening, everyone was going over to her sister, Maria's house. I don't know how many people crowded into this little house. Once again, I was hailed as a hero. Once again, there were these tables sagging under the weight of the spaghetti, and lasagna, and cannelloni, and Italian bread, and I don't know what all else.

The next morning, I went to Church with them (interesting point – these Italians weren't Catholic; they were Wesleyans), and after church, Sophia and her brother and sister-in-law were to drive me across the Peace Bridge to meet my folks who were to rendezvous with me in Fort Erie. But, before we left, we just had to stop at cousin Rocco's, where, once again – big crowd – hero – incredible quantities of food – celebration. I worried for the supports under the Peace Bridge as we crossed.

But, I have never forgotten the simple, genuine, open-hearted generosity of that wonderful Christian family, and how they shared with me so freely and so beautifully, only knowing me for a day.

St. Paul had never met the Colossian Christians, to whom he wrote one of his most endearing letters. He says to them, "We give thanks to God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, praying always for you, since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and the love which you have for all the saints." (Col. 1:3-4).

The Colossians had found Christ through the faithful ministry of one of their own, a disciple named Epaphras. He had informed Paul of their existence. And Paul loved them, even though he didn't know them. This is love in the Spirit. This is true community. Life in Christ's Kingdom is most naturally a celebration. So, rejoice!




BIBLE STUDIES

In Exodus 18:5-12, we find the wonderful story of Jethro, Moses' father-in-law, coming to meet Moses after the people of Israel had come out of Egypt, through the Red Sea, and finally arrived at Mount Sinai. It says that Moses told Jethro about all that the Lord had done for them, delivering them from Pharaoh, saving them from the sea, and leading them through the wilderness. (Now, for the eagle-eyed Bible students here, I want you to know I am aware that Jethro was "priest of Midian." Considering the Midianites' later behaviour and idolatry, that's not really a resounding endorsement of his credentials. Their belief system was, at best, rather dodgy).

But our text records Jethro's words: "Now I know that the Lord is greater than all the gods...". It's an important passage, friends. This is the earliest incident, recorded in the Bible, of someone coming to faith in the living God through hearing an inspired account of God's activity.

Paul asked the Roman Christians, "What advantage then has a Jew?" He answered his own question, "Chiefly, that they have the very words of God." (Ro. 3:1-2 NIV).



Presbyterians are a blessed people. Our heritage is long and deep. We were present on the very cutting edge of the Reformation, that titanic movement of five centuries ago that would place the Bible, our greatest earthly treasure, in the hands of ordinary Christians in Scotland and across the world.

To hold it in our hands, to read it, to study it, to let it transform us, remains our marvellous privilege.

PASTORAL CARE

Don't be in any rush to be a teacher, my friends... We get it wrong nearly every time we open our mouths. (James 3:1-2, The Message.)

Believe it or not, I spend about as much time deciding which quotes will bookend my remarks as I do writing the remarks themselves. That's because I take words seriously, both as a writer and as an editor. Deep down, every author hopes to win critical acceptance and an enthusiastic readership; and deep down, I'm no different. So before continuing, I'll give you a moment decide whether (a) I'm "headed for a black hole in hell [as] a loudmouth filled with hot air" (2 Peter 2:17-18), (b) an unabashed scriptural cherry picker, or (c) an apostatic wolf in sheep's clothing, "never really part of us" (1 John 2:19).

(Because if your answer to any (or all) of these questions is yes, you should probably give my writings a wide berth. I'm serious.)

I like Eugene Peterson. He's a plainspoken guy and not afraid to paraphrase, which opens the door to fresh interpretations and emboldens me to do likewise. I can't credit him with my views on pastoral care, but I am indebted to him for reminding me that Biblical meaning can reside on multiple levels. Imagine then my pleasure at coming across this little gem: "Cultivate your own relationship with God, but don't impose it on others" (Romans 14:22.) All of the Epistles are rife with advice on how to live and what to believe and what to do and not do, not to mention remonstrations aplenty for self-professed sceptics like me. But with Peterson's phrasing, this verse leapt off the page affirming my entire approach to Christianity... despite the irony of continuing to pen epistles of my own exhorting us all do better.

I can honestly say that I'm completely on board when it comes to going my own way and can be downright fiery if I find that way is blocked. When I have a vision for something, I don't change course lightly. And so, after more than a decade in my current role, I'm finally going to share my personal vision statement for the Pastoral Care Team: Where Jesus Himself would feel right at home.

Like Him, I take an expansionist view of who is considered part of the First Church family. Whether someone regularly attends Sunday service or tithes doesn't interest me in terms of visitation. If they identify in any way with First Church, and there's a Team member willing and at hand, that's all I need to know. As a result, we've picked up more than a few strays over the years, but we're also brought others back into the fold. (When you haven't darkened the church door in ages, it's easy to believe your old congregation stopped caring about you long ago.)

Still, I expect more of myself, and my Team, than that. If you're part of my regular readership, you've surely figured out that I don't consider pastoral care the exclusive purview of a minister. All of us can and should be prepared to extend kindness, the bedrock on which it rests. There's a but, though, and a really important one at that: Not everyone is cut out to be a Pastoral Care Team member, just as not every Christian is cut out to be a pastor. To be a member of the First Church Pastoral Care Team, you must be prepared to extend a lot more than kindness.

Yes, the Bible has lots to say about friendship, mostly good, some bad; in terms of quotes, "...the very best way to love [is to] put your life on the line for your friends" (John 15:13) is probably the most familiar. Of course, it's wonderful when Team members become close to those they visit. But when Jesus says "you are my friends" (John 15:14), He's talking to His disciples not the world at large. He doesn't say anything about being friends with the world, only to love it. And he sure doesn't say anything about only loving your friends.

In short, our calling is not to make friends. It's not to keep tabs on our favourites. It is not to treasure compatibility. It's to connect with people who may not have any friends, let alone family. The forgotten ones, those Lost Sheep whom scripture tells us we need to find and who may need a little time before they're willing to expose their soft underbellies. It is our calling to say "I don't know you and I may not like you very much. But I can set aside a few hours over the course of a year to remind you that love can take many forms." Or in pithier terms, to:

Show up. Be present. Make sure you return.

I alone cannot convince anyone to join my Team; you'll likely need a nudge from the Friend (John 16), which is what Peterson calls the Spirit, a callback to Jesus' own relationship to The Twelve. However, I can assure you that all it will cost you to find out is an email message and a chat. After that, we'll know soon enough if you'd be a good fit. Besides, there's always the delightful possibility that we're exactly what each other needs.

For what it's worth, I'm also a lot more plainspoken in person.

FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT

The insurance company is still looking at options to either repair or replace our office air conditioner. We have no timeline for when this item will be resolved.

Two major projects approved in the 2024 budget are complete: the resurfacing of the parking lot; and the replacement of the stairs to the basement. A third project to replace the stairs exiting onto Fifth Street is scheduled to start soon. A big thank-you to Bruce Davidson for spearheading these efforts.

We have engaged Roof Tile Management to repair two known leaks in the roof. Work should be starting this fall. The cost estimate for these repairs is around \$75,000. However, total cost may exceed this amount if additional repairs are required.



Overall givings to the church as of Aug 31 totaled \$126,262.87 compared to \$130,191.87 this time last year. For now, our budget is in fairly good shape. However, this will change noticeably once the above projects have been completed, putting us in a significant deficit position. Please, if you are in a position to do so, consider increasing your donations to the church in order to help keep our finances in the best possible condition.
